Scope

This conference aims to showcase current research conducted by early-career pharmacy researchers, pharmacists and pre-registration trainees. The conference has been coordinated by postgraduate students at Durham University to foster a community of pharmacy researchers and provide an opportunity to present current research, network and develop collaborations between pharmacy researchers, practicing pharmacists and pre-registration trainees in the surrounding areas.

The call for submissions was purposively broad to include research relevant to i) pharmacy practice including electronic records, health service delivery audits, de-prescribing, pharmacy education, medical sociology and public health and ii) pharmaceutical sciences including chemistry, molecular biology, microbiology, pharmacology, and pharmaceutics.

The conference is free to hospital, community, academic and industry pre-registration trainees and pharmacists. The conference is also free for early-career postgraduate researchers.

Prizes

A £25 Amazon voucher will be awarded for the best poster presentation and oral presentations.

Programme

Oral presentations will be delivered in parallel sessions and be divided according to the broad themes outlined above. Presentations will be approximately 15 minutes in length with 5 minutes for questions.

Posters will be presented over lunch and poster presenters will be asked to provide a 3-minute summary of their posters to small groups.

Inspiring juniors, the value of a research culture in patient care

Wasim Bagir, Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust

Wasim is the Lead Clinical Pharmacist for the Northumberland Vanguard Primary and Acute Care Service. He is leading an integrated team of pharmacists and technicians to develop and test pharmacy services for patients across Northumberland. Prior to this he was lead for Research, Development and Quality Improvement at Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust and Prescribing Support Team Leader at The Village Green Surgery General Medical Practice. He graduated from The Robert Gordon University with a BSc. in Pharmacy, before completing a PhD at the University of Newcastle-Upon-Tyne: 'A Survey of the use of medicines with prolonged oral clearance in the elderly in North-East England'. Wasim has also worked as a lecturer and achieved an independent prescribing qualification in 2007. Wasim has worked on various successful research projects including: an RCT investigating osteoporosis group clinics, implementing self-administration of medicines (SAM) across an NHS Trust, developing a clinico-ethical framework for medication review in care homes and evaluating pharmacist prescribing across North East England. Recent achievements include receiving The Hugh McGavock Bursary for Prescribing and Research in Medicines Management 2016 and winning the United Kingdom Clinical Pharmacist Association Patient Safety Award for Implementing pharmacist prescribing across an NHS Trust in 2014.


